# CZECH CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

## carp, walnuts, lead, and apples

Carp (a fish) and potato salad is the traditional Christmas eve meal in Czech Culture. This stems from the fact that carp was not very expensive, and therefore accessible to the larger population.

Czechs also like to predict their future in multiple ways. Cutting an apple in half will predict your health for the upcoming year: if you see a star, you will be healthy, if you see a cross, well let's hope you see a star. Walnuts can also be used. Traditionally people choose 4 walnuts to predict the health in each of the 4 seasons. If you crack it open and find a healthy and fresh walnut, that season will be good to you.

Other traditions include pouring hot lead into water to read your future depending on the shape - however this one can be dangerous!

### Czech Christmas Traditions

In many families Ježíšek decorates the tree and leaves the presents while the children are eating dinner or playing outside. A ringing of the bell will tell him that he can come, which is why you see so many bells being sold in the Christmas markets. In Zelný trh you can write your letter to Ježíšek and see if he will come and visit you :)



# WINTER BREAK - IMPORTANT INFO

## December 21-January 3

Due to the delayed start of the semester, classes will resume after the winter break, so students should keep this in mind when making holiday plans.

The Czech Government has reinstated the rule, starting Nov. 9 that students entering the Czech Republic from 'red' countries must produce a negative test. You can find the current regulations on our website under '[conditions for entry](#)', these current regulations will be updated on Nov. 9 when they will become valid, and on the Ministry of Interior's [website](#).

# FINAL EXAMS

## Make sure you register

For most programmes, multiple dates are provided to sit for final exams. As such, it is necessary to register for your final exams. Please make sure you know the examination method for your courses. Additionally, it is important to remember to cancel your registration PRIOR to the exam date if you wish to take the exam at a different time. Failure to sit for your exam at the time you registered for may result in a failure. While you will have the option to take the exam again (provided there are additional dates available), both grades may show up (depending on your programme).

# THESIS DEFENSE AND FINAL STATE EXAMS

## Don't forget any steps.

As the end of the semester nears, it is important to know the different requirements for your specific programme regarding when a final version of your thesis is due, when you must register for your state exam, and when you must sign up for your thesis defense.

Dates are different for every programme, therefore it is crucial for you to reach out to your programme guarantor or department secretary to make sure you don't miss anything!

### State of Emergency extended to Dec. 12 (may be extended)

## Informing MUNI of positive coronavirus results

Anyone who tests positive for coronavirus will be contacted by the Hygienic Department with the phone number you provided. Please do not change phone numbers if you are waiting for results.

1. Report your positive test in [IS System](#).
2. Contact your study department and the IRO office at FSS that you have tested positive.

If you live in the university dormitories, the dormitories will be alerted by the FSS IRO office that you have tested positive and they will contact you if new arrangements need to be made.
