

UNIVERSITY LIGHT IS YELLOW: WHAT THIS MEANS FOR FSS

MU is operating following the university traffic-light system. The risk assessment level is currently YELLOW.

- MU buildings are closed to the public.
- Classes are limited to a maximum of 200 people at FSS. Please see all current measures in this
 document.
- People with symptoms of infectious viral infections are prohibited from entering MU buildings.
- Students and employees are obliged to inform MU about their return from a foreign country.
- Students who reside at MU dormitories must get tested every seven days. The exception includes people who have been vaccinated, recovered from COVID-19 (within the last 180 days), or tested.
- MU asks <u>students</u> and <u>employees</u> to fill in information about their vaccination status.

Foreigners entering the country should see instruction for <u>students</u> and <u>employees</u>. See also current <u>restrictions</u> in the Czech Republic.

We urge students to remember that entry requirements may change, and should keep their travel plans in mind so they can return for classes in February.

Exam period and state exam

- Examinations they can take place in person, but it is necessary to prove O-N-T/V-D-T in the IS and maintain a space of min. 1.5 m in all directions
- Teachers are obliged to offer an online form of exams
- by 29 November 2021, teachers are obliged to inform students about the conditions of the end of the course, and by 19 December 2021, to announce exam dates
- Bachelor's, Master's, and doctoral state final exams will be held exclusively online in January and February 2022
- For the autumn semester 2021, the obligation to submit one copy of the printed bachelor's or master's thesis is canceled, it is to be submitted only digitally via the IS

TIPS FOR WRITING A THESIS

- 1. As you're writing, be sure to write down any book or author you cite so you do not miss a citation. In the best case scenario, write the full citation to make it easier in the end.
- 2. Reading out loud helps with proofreading.
- 3. Start putting your thesis into the template at least 2 days before submission to avoid stress around formatting.
- 4. Finalize your page numbers, photos, and all content prior to creating your Index.
- 5. Check headings and page breaks.
- 6. Make sure you know your departments requirements regarding word count. Are spaces included? Does the index and acknowledgements page count? The final edits and pages add a lot to word counts at the end.

VISAS AND RESIDENCY PERMITS

Make sure you are able to travel back

Please double check the expiration of your student visa or residence permit before traveling during the break. You will want to be sure you will be able to return in case you plan to stay home until the start of the Spring semester. It isn't possible to predict what will be the travel regulations, but having valid legal status to enter the Czech Republic will be important!

DECEMBER HOLIDAYS IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

5 December is St. Nicholas Day (Mikuláš). On this day you will typically see people dressed up as one of three characters: St. Nicholas (Mikuláš), the Angel (anděl) who represents the Good, and the Devil (čert) representing the Evil and will visit children. The characters will ask children if they will be good, and children should say yes and sing a song to get sweets.

The Christmas holiday season is very important to the Czech Republic. The Christmas days last 3 days, 24-26 December. Christmas Eve in the Czech Republic is the most celebrated day. The typical day will be spent decorating the tree, baking vánočka (Christmas bread) and eating the traditional meal of Carp and Potato Salad. After dinner, many families will sing Christmas carols and open presents.

There are a series of Christmas traditions and superstitions that are followed throughout the years which can be found here.

25-26 December are typically spent now a days relaxing with family.

Czech Christmas Traditions

In the Czech Republic it is Ježíšek (baby Jesus) who brings children their presents, not Santa Claus. In some families it is believed that Ježíšek decorates the tree and leaves the presents while the children are eating dinner or playing outside. A ringing of the bell will tell him that he can come, which is why you see so many bells being sold in the Christmas markets (virtually). Unfortunately, Christmas markets in Brno had to be closed due to worsening epidemiological situation. The Christmas Trams will operate from 4pm to 9pm on weekdays and from 11 am to 9pm weekends until December 23rd. You can purchase tickets with the standard fee on the tram. Vaccination - how to get it

If you haven't already been vaccinated against Covid-19 you now have numerous options as a self payer (if you have European Health Insurance or Czech Pubic health insurance, you should also follow the information on how to <u>register</u> for the vaccine without paying).

As always, test results and vaccination certificates should be uploaded into the IS.

Vaccination - how to pay for it

FSS students should first try to be reimbursed by their health insurance company. Foreigners.cz has written an <u>article</u> about the process to do so for the different insurance companies.

If your insurance company doesn't reimburse you, you can request reimbursement from FSS. In order to do so, you must have completed both doses of the vaccine (or in the case of Johnson and Johnson just the 1 dose) and have the proof of payment. Please email Klára Němečková at 217236@mail.muni.cz to set up a time to meet with her to fill out the paperwork for reimbursement.

This policy will continue through the fall 2021 semester to prove our students more time to get vaccinated.

Vaccination recognition

Please use this <u>link</u> to find out if the vaccination certificate from your country is recognized in the Czech Republic Only certificated from countries on the list are recognized here and only vaccination by vaccine authorised by the European Medicines Agency (Vaxzevria/AstraZeneca; Spikevax/Moderna; Comirnaty/Pfizer; Janssen) or a vaccine manufactured in accordance with a patent for the above vaccines that is approved by the World Health Organization for emergency use (the Covishield vaccine) are recognized.

If you are vaccinated by other vaccine or if your certificate is from a country which is not on the list, you are considered as unvaccinated by the Czech government. This means that all current rules apply to you, so you have to stay in 5 days self-isolation after travelling from red/dark-red country and get the PCR test after these 5 days.

REPORTING POSITIVE TEST RESULTS

Informing MUNI of positive coronavirus results

Anyone who tests positive for coronavirus will be contacted by the Hygienic Department with the phone number you provided. Please do not change phone numbers if you are waiting for results.

If students test positive for Coronavirus they must do the following.

- 1. Report your positive test in IS System.
- 2. Contact your study department and the IRO office at FSS that you have tested positive.

If you live in the university dormitories, the dormitories will be alerted by the FSS IRO office that you have tested positive and they will contact you if new arrangements need to be made.

CORONAVIRUS UPDATE

Regulations by Government for the country

- Facemasks (N95) are required inside all public buildings and in public transportation
- Recognized vaccination OR recovery from Covid-19 (within the past 180 days) is required to eat at restaurants, swim in pools, etc. Cultural and social events have the same requirements. Negative tests will be recognized for people who have already received their first dose and those who cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons.
- PCR tests are now valid for 3 days, and antigen tests for 24 hours.

ENTRY TO THE CZECH REPUBLIC

all students should check the current restrictions before traveling

Entry requirements are based on the current ranking of countries you have spent time in, and if you are vaccinated with a recognized vaccine. It is up to each student to determine what procedure they must follow, as it is different in every case. Masaryk University has created a helpful 'app' to help walk through the current restrictions and what steps must be taken. To understand if you need to be tested, self isolate, etc., you can use this <u>flow chart</u>.

Students who are required to receive a negative covid test will need to continue to wear a respirator in dormitories and all public places until their negative covid test. This is the case for students travelling from all locations except 'black countries' these countries have a stricter testing requirement and isolation is required. To stay up to date with what color your departure country falls under, please use the MU <u>website</u> and always check the Ministry <u>website</u>.
