PAST EVENTS AT THE FACULTY


Brunch for international employees

DECEMBER HOLIDAYS IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

5 December is St. Nicholas Day (Mikuláš). On this day you will typically see people dressed up as one of three characters: St. Nicholas (Mikuláš), the Angel (anděl) who represents the Good, and the Devil (čert) representing the Evil and will visit children. The characters will ask children if they will be good, and children should say yes and sing a song to get sweets.

The Christmas holiday season is very important to the Czech Republic. The Christmas days last 3 days, 24-26 December. Christmas Eve in the Czech Republic is the most celebrated day. The typical day will be spent decorating the tree, baking vánočka (Christmas bread) and eating the traditional meal of Carp and Potato Salad. After dinner, many families will sing Christmas carols and open presents.

There are a series of Christmas traditions and superstitions that are followed throughout the years which can be found here.

NAVIGATING ACADEMIC TEXTS: 10 GREAT TIPS TO CONQUER YOUR READING LIST WITH A SMILE



Tips from Monika Brusenbauch Meislová Associate Professor at the Department of International Relations and European Studies

In one of my recent classes, we had a candid discussion about the struggles many students face with assigned readings. It became evident that students would love to have a workshop on academic reading skills, as these skills had never been formally addressed in any of their university courses. Heeding this call, I organized an engaging workshop in our next class, dedicated to mastering the art of reading (without dozing off :-). We had a great time together sharing various valuable tips and best (but also worst :-) practices in reading strategies. The session was so insightful that it seemed unfair to limit this knowledge to our classroom alone. Hence, I am sharing our top 10 tips with you, so get ready to turn the page to a new chapter in your reading journey:

1. Read abstracts, introductions and conclusions first

Diving straight into the main text can be overwhelming. Start with abstracts, introductions and conclusions. These sections often encapsulate the core ideas and can offer a roadmap for what is to come, saving you both time and effort.

2. Highlight and underline... wisely

Highlighting or underlining key points is a tried and tested method. But remember, less is more. Over-highlighting can clutter your page, making it hard to distinguish what is truly important.

3. Skim and scan for quick insights

Do not ignore headings, subheadings, and text in bold or italics. They are your clues to the main ideas. Skimming and scanning for keywords or phrases can provide a quick snapshot of the content, guiding your deeper reading efforts.

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4. Prioritize your reading list

Faced with multiple assignments? Start with the most important or challenging ones when your mind is fresh and focused. This strategy ensures that your peak concentration is put to good use.

5. Active reading for deeper engagement

Passive reading often leads to forgotten content. Engage actively with the text by highlighting, underlining, or jotting down important points. This not only aids memory but also deepens your understanding.

6. Eliminate distractions

Distractions are the bane of effective reading. Use apps like "Focus@Will" or "Forest" to block out distractions and keep your concentration on track.

7. Question as you read

Start each reading section with a purpose. Write down questions you want answers to before you begin. This approach keeps your reading goal-oriented and efficient.

8. Teach what you learn

One of the best ways to solidify understanding is to teach the material to someone else, or even yourself. This method reinforces your knowledge and often highlights areas that need more attention.

9. Create flashcards for quick recalls

Flashcards are an excellent tool for quick revision. Jot down the main points or concepts on flashcards and use them for speedy reviews.

10. Take breaks

Use techniques like the Pomodoro Technique (25 minutes of work followed by a 5-minute break) to maintain energy and focus.

Academic reading is a skill, and like any skill, it can be honed and refined. These tips, distilled from our class workshop, are a great place to start. Happy reading and learning!
